

SCENIC PARKWAYS

Due to the 2017 Kenow wildfire, certain areas of the park may be temporarily unavailable due to restoration work. Parks Canada is working hard to get these areas of the park re-opened as soon as possible. Please check www.parkscanada.ca/waterton for the latest updates.



PARK ENTRANCE ROAD / KOOTENAI BROWN

The 8 km route from the Park gate to the community features outstanding views of the Park's namesake chain of sparkling lakes.

AKAMINA PARKWAY / CAMERON LAKE

Begins in the village and runs 16 km (10 miles) up the Cameron Creek Valley to glacier-formed Cameron Lake. The First Oil Well in Western Canada commemorates Western Canada's first producing oil well. The Continental Divide parallels the roadway and the boundaries of Alberta, British Columbia and Montana converge at Cameron Lake.

BISON PADDOCK CIRCLE DRIVE

Located north of the Park entrance gate on Highway #6 is the Bison Paddock Loop Road. It rolls across a stunning glacial landscape of moraines and eskers. Native grasslands are home to a small herd of plains bison which are direct descendants from the original herds of the Great Plains. The Bison herd has temporarily been relocated until their handling facility has been repaired and the range has sufficiently recovered.

CHIEF MOUNTAIN INTERNATIONAL HIGHWAY / BELLY RIVER

Departs Highway #5 east of the Park gate. It leads to Glacier National Park, USA, and the Chief Mountain customs station. The seasonal road offers dramatic scenic vistas high above the Waterton Valley. Learn more at the exhibit there. The Belly River campground is located along this route. Sacred Chief Mountain dominates the skyline.

RED ROCK PARKWAY / RED ROCK CANYON

Meanders 15 km (9 miles) over rolling prairie through the Blakiston Valley. It best illustrates "Where the Mountains Meet the Prairie." The parkway follows the ancient Buffalo Trail used by Indigenous hunting parties. Learn more at roadside exhibits. Dramatic views of Mt. Blakiston, the park's highest mountain (2940 m/9645 ft) are complimented by strikingly colored red and green rocks. Red Rock Canyon offers a lovely day use area with trails, exhibits, and picnic shelters.



CYCLING PATHWAYS

KOOTENAI BROWN TRAIL

6.9 km / 13.8 mi. return Multi-use paved trail parallels the park entrance road from the Park gate to Linnet Lake parking lot. Great views.

WATERTON VILLAGE

3.2 km / 2 mi. return The multi-use trail circles the village and meanders along the shoreline. Wheelchairs and bikes can easily maneuver this trail.

WISHBONE TRAIL

13 km / 8.1 mi. return Trailhead: 0.5 km along Chief Mountain Highway

SNOWSHOE TRAIL

16.4 km / 10.2 mi. return Trailhead: Red Rock Canyon parking lot

AKAMINA PASS TRAIL

1.3 km / 0.8 mi. one way Trailhead: 14.4 km along Akamina Parkway

CRANDELL LOOP TRAIL

4 – 20 km / 2.4 – 12 mi. for the entire loop 6 km along Akamina Parkway or 6 km along Red Rock Canyon

ACCESS TO ADVENTURE



A LOOK BACK AT THE KENOW WILDFIRE IN WATERTON LAKES NATIONAL PARK SEPTEMBER 2017

On August 30, 2017, after an intense lightning and thunder storm, Parks Canada Fire Management staff in Waterton Lakes National Park detected a wildfire about ten kilometres (6 miles) from the park boundary, in British Columbia. Exceptionally hot weather, strong winds, and extremely dry conditions fuelled the extreme behaviour of the Kenow Wildfire over the next week.

Parks Canada worked closely with partner agencies and neighbouring jurisdictions as the fire progressed. Fire crews created fuel line breaks and helicopters dropped water on hotspots to prevent the spread of fire. In addition, fire retardant was sprayed on picnic shelters, washrooms, and other visitor facilities. In the Waterton townsite, high-volume water pumps and sprinkler systems were installed around the edge of the community and trees, shrubs, grasses, and other flammable items were removed from properties. As preparations were underway, an evacuation alert was issued, and on September 8, with hot, dry weather and high winds in the forecast, an evacuation order was issued.

The Kenow Wildfire firmly established itself in Waterton Lakes National Park on September 11, 2017, moving northeast down the Cameron Valley along the Akamina Parkway. Later in the evening, flames were visible from the Townsite and on the north side of Crandell Mountain. The wildfire began to move north at a high rate of speed, spreading through the grasslands along the park's entrance road. Overnight, the wildfire moved north and east out of the park and into adjacent lands.

In the end, the wildfire burned 38,000 hectares, including 20,329 hectares in Waterton Lakes National Park. The wildfire had a significant impact on built infrastructure in the park. Akamina Parkway (16 kilometres), Red Rock Parkway (15 kilometres, 9 miles), associated bridges, guardrails, signs, picnic areas and parking areas were affected despite the best efforts of facility protection crews. Unfortunately many hiking trails were affected by the Kenow fire. In addition, the Visitor Centre, Crandell Campground, the maintenance shop at the golf course, many buildings at Canyon Youth Camp, the Alpine Stables, staff housing and associated infrastructure such as water and electrical systems were destroyed by the fire.

2017 KENOW FIRE TIMELINE

AUGUST 30:

A lightning strike ignites a wildfire on Kenow Mountain in British Columbia, close to the park boundary.

SEPTEMBER 2:

A small 0.5 hectare spot fire starts inside the western boundary of the park.

SEPTEMBER 5:

An Evacuation Alert is issued for Waterton Lakes National Park.

SEPTEMBER 8:

An Evacuation Order is issued for Waterton Lakes National Park.

SEPTEMBER 9:

Personnel from across Canada, including structural fire crews from regional municipalities, helicopters, fire engines (ladder trucks), water tenders, and facility protection resources are in place in the park.

SEPTEMBER 11:

The wildfire escapes the park's boundaries at night. Throughout the night, firefighters worked tirelessly to protect the Waterton townsite and Prince of Wales Hotel National Historic Site within the park.

SEPTEMBER 12:

Fire suppression continues as the fire is still active.

SEPTEMBER 19: The fire is classified as "being held".

SEPTEMBER 20:

The public is allowed to enter the park after the Evacuation Order is lifted.

OCTOBER 3:

The Kenow Wildfire is classified as "under control" and "being patrolled".




A HEARTY THANK YOU AND GRATITUDE

Heroic efforts by Parks Canada, with the support of fire fighters from agencies across the country and municipal fire departments from nearby communities and the cities of Lethbridge and Calgary, saved the Prince of Wales Hotel National Historic Site and the community of Waterton. We are forever grateful for your courage, your tireless efforts, and for all that you accomplished.

LOOKING AHEAD AFTER THE FIRE

This landscape has evolved with fire and will transform over time. Wildfires occur naturally and fulfil critical ecosystem functions, with the positive ecological effects usually greater than the negative. These are dynamic ecosystems, changing and adapting in response to natural forces. This wildfire has removed canopy cover in the park which will provide an opportunity for smaller, groundbased plants to establish. A complete understanding of the impact of this wildfire on the park's ecology will take many years to assess.





WATERTON'S WILDLIFE AFTER THE FIRE

The Kenow Wildfire was one of exceptional severity. Under less severe circumstances, larger animals are usually able to flee and smaller animals may seek refuge underground. The fire's rapid growth and heavy smoke unfortunately meant some animals did succumb to the wildfire. However, healthy animals, including elk, deer, moose, bears, and sheep were observed within the area soon after the fire. Waterton's wildlife have evolved with fire on the landscape and will thrive in Waterton again in the years to come.

STUBBORN AS A BULL

Parks Canada relocated most of the bison herd from Waterton Lakes National Park ahead of the wildfire to keep the animals safe. The bison were gently shepherded into the handling facility and transported by truck to Grasslands National Park in Saskatchewan.

One bull did not cooperate during relocation attempts. With the urgency of the fire situation, staff left the bull in a location where it had the best possible chance of survival. The bull survived the incident sheltering near a pond, demonstrating how wildlife have evolved to survive with fire on the landscape. Parks Canada is hoping to bring bison back once the native grassland recovers, and the handling facility is rebuilt.

VISITOR OPPORTUNITIES

There is still lots to do in the park and unique opportunities for visitors to experience Waterton's natural areas. For a full list of open areas and recreational opportunities, we encourage visitors to check **www.parkscanada.ca/waterton** for up-to-date information.

Plan your visit ahead of time. Visiting in the spring or fall, weekdays in the summer, or early morning or evening will provide the best opportunity for easier access and less crowding.

Visitor safety is a top priority for Parks Canada. Large areas of the Park remain closed as a result of significant hazards caused by the Kenow wildfire. Information on closed areas can be found at **www.parkscanada.ca/waterton**. For your safety, respect all area closures.



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LINNET LAKE LOOP For the less experienced or those with small children a leisurely walk around the Linnet Lake Loop will take less than half an hour on a paved, but slightly rough path. There are a few benches along the way to enjoy the small but gem-like lake.

THE KOOTENAI BROWN TRAIL was created as a legacy gift to Canadians in recognition of the 125th anniversary of Canada's National Parks. A multi-use pathway about seven kilometres one way is perfect for families or for biking and has unparalleled views of the mountains and Waterton Lakes. The casual walk descends through prairie grasslands where you will find John George Kootenai Brown's gravesite, along with those of his two wives. Kootenai Brown, the first appointed park official, had significant influence in the development of the area. You will find an information plaque at the viewpoint showcasing historical information.

WISHBONE TRAIL runs alongside Chief Mountain Highway. It's approximately 10 kilometres (6 miles) long one way, and is a somewhat challenging trail. There is little shade on this trail and there is no elevation gain, so pack according to the weather. Throughout the trail you will discover many of Waterton's famous flora and fauna.

THE TRAIL TO VIMY PEAK is a steep and difficult climb up to 7200 ft in elevation. To get to this trail head you must walk, bike, or ride in by horseback (which is a popular choice) on the Wishbone Trail. You can also access the trail by boat shuttle service to Wishbone Landing. The hike is eleven kilometres each way and is an impressive work of nature. Vimy Peak is easy to identify - it stands out since there are no other mountains in front of it.



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DARK SKY DESIGNATION

Waterton Lakes National Park and Glacier National Park in the United States have recently become recognized by the International Dark-Sky Association as a provisional International Dark Sky Park. Dark Sky Park status recognizes a community's effort in reducing the amount of light that is sent up to into the sky at night. Parks Canada and the U.S. National Park Service are the first to achieve the trans-boundary IDA International Dark Sky Park designation.


The park is committed to protecting its environment by promoting responsible lighting, installing skycompliant lighting in the townsite and ensuring new development permits comply with dark sky regulations. Nighttime environment for wildlife is improved and dark observing sites for astronomers and visitors to experience exceptional starry night skies is accessible. Cameron Lake, Red Rock Canyon, and the Bison Paddock are some of the best places for observing the dark sky. A seasoned astronomer may use a telescope and a sophisticated camera to observe on their own. However, an amateur could join Parks Canada on one of the special events Dark Sky Theatre Programs led by staff and volunteers. Admire the backdrop of constellations, The Milky Way, a variety of planets and craters on the moon during your visit to the International Dark Sky Park in Waterton.

Dark skies are rare and not easily observed. Obtaining this achievement is valuable to the environment. It won't be long before much of the world will no longer be able to see the Milky Way because too many man-made lights have made the Milky Way virtually invisible. Caring for our environment, and taking steps such as preventing or controlling further light pollution, is imperative so we can enjoy the natural beauties of the world.

WATERFALLS



There are several waterfalls to discover in Waterton. Cameron Falls is located at the west edge of town and is the highlight of many visitor's trips.

Without a doubt it is an attraction worth photographing. It regularly draws a crowd because of the crystal-clear mountain water cascading down over 1.5 billionyear-old Pre-Cambrian rock.

Those who stand admiring the falls will often feel the gentle mist of water dusting their skin as the water roars loudly below. There are several view points along and above the waterfall to capture spectacular images and admire this work of nature.

Situated on Highway 5 just after Red Rock Parkway, Waterton Lakes Golf Course is one of Canada's oldest courses.

Throughout the 18-hole course, the majestic views continue with the iconic background of the Prince of Wales hotel and the sparkling water of the upper Waterton Lake.

Every now and again, as Waterton is well known for its wildlife, you will come across a bear or other popular Waterton creatures in the area trying a little golf of their own. The flag poles on the greens are often a familiar distraction to the animals.

The Waterton Lakes Golf Course offers twilight golf throughout the season along with leagues and lessons for those needing to brush up on their swing. Finish your day at the Clubhouse on the patio with a full-service bar and enjoy the impeccable view with your friends and get inspired to golf all over again.

Our original plan to get married outside in front of one of nature's most beautiful backdrops had to be altered, due to the charred, burnt landscape. As such, we had the ceremony in the center of the still-green, unscathed townsite, at the Waterton Community Center. The weather leading up to the wedding was hot, calm and sunny, essentially like summer, and the snowstorm miraculously didn't hit until the day after the wedding! With wedding guests coming from Chile, Norway, the UK and the USA, we were also surrounded by many of our friends, family and fellow residents from Waterton. Our wedding turned into more than just a celebration of two people – it was a celebration for all of Waterton." -Keith B. Robinson

Here are some of our favourite winter Waterton activities:

- **CROSS COUNTRY SKIING** This activity is for outdoor enthusiasts that want to get off the beaten path! The experience Waterton offers is terrain that is mostly ungroomed as fewer visitors frequent this area in the winter. It really is the best hidden secret and what better way to uncover them than to glide along an ungroomed trail, creating your own path.
- **SNOWSHOEING** Like cross country skiing, snowshoeing in Waterton is an exciting expedition into the pristine environment. This is an experience that will leave you refreshed and reconnected with nature and your snowshoeing partners. Get in a great workout while trekking through and exploring the beauty of Waterton!










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


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
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
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WATERTON IS DISTINCT



There are eighteen World UNESCO Heritage Sites in Canada and four in Alberta. UNESCO, an acronym for the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, was created in 1945, and is an agency of the United Nations that sponsors programs to promote science, education and the arts.

On December 6, 1995, Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park was designated a UNESCO Natural World Heritage Site. The park was given this designation because of its outstanding landforms and distinct climate – it's where the mountains meet the prairies. It was also designated a Natural World Heritage Site because of the area's International Peace Park status, which recognizes the outstanding goodwill and friendship between Canada and the USA and between Waterton and Glacier. Waterton-Glacier was named the first International Peace Park in 1932.

Waterton has been given a number of internationally recognized designations:



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

Waterton Wildlife Weekend

SEPTEMBER 13 – 16, 2018

If you've never heard the bugling call of an elk or witnessed the passionate duelling of male big horn sheep during rutting season, you're missing just a couple special wildlife moments found in Waterton Lakes National Park. Every September, Waterton Wildlife Weekend celebrates these phenomenal glimpses of nature in one of the most gorgeous settings in Canada.Waterton is a 505 square kilometre (195 square mile) park. Although it is one of Canada's smaller national parks, it never seems to disappoint wildlife watchers. It is very rare to not see some sort of wildlife in Waterton whether it be a black bear on the side of a hill or big horn sheep in the village. The festival developed out of people's curiosity of wildlife and the event has a packed schedule for all ages and interests, from naturalist talks to wildlife photography workshops.

Wildflower Festival

JUNE 14 – JUNE 19, 2018

After a long and arduous climb up the ridge, you finally crest the peak and gaze upon hundreds of wildflowers. The guide points out rare species that are only found in Waterton such as a cluster of western wake-robin, and Lewis' mock-orange. Along another slope the group spots more provincially rare species of wildflowers such as the odd-shaped mountain lady's slipper, mountain hollyhock, and the cheery pygmy poppy. This guided hike is only a fraction of what is offered during the popular Waterton Wildflower Festival. Why is Waterton granted the title the 'Wildflower Capital of Canada?' Geologic events resulted in Waterton Lakes National Park being a mountainous area that directly abuts the prairies. In Waterton, prairie plants from the Great Plains to the east overlap with Rocky Mountain plants from the north, and intermountain plants from the west. Forty-five different vegetation communities occur in the park including grasslands, shrublands, wetlands, lakes, spruce-fir, pine and aspen forests, and alpine meadows.

ROBINSON/KRETZ FAMILY Waterton Shoreline Cruise Co. & 49 Degrees North Pizza

In 1952 and '53, a school principal named Stan Kretz spent his summers working as a fish warden at Cameron Lake. In 1954 he and his wife Vivian began offering boat services on Upper Waterton Lake. Over the years, Wanda Robinson (nee Kretz), her younger brother Rod Kretz, and their spouses (Ed Robinson and Nancy Kretz) grew the business to 4 tour boats, including the purchase and restoration of the historic MV International.

In recent years, the third generation has taken on an increasing role in daily operations of the sightseeing tour boat operation that transports passengers from Canada to the USA. Going forward with their tourism-oriented post-secondary degrees, these young men plan to open many new attractions and services in the coming years, to enhance the Waterton visitor experience.

SULEMAN FAMILY Bayshore Inn Resort & Spa / Waterton Glacier Suites

Over the last decade, they have truly immersed themselves in the community by participating in events and volunteering much of their time and energy to making the village just a little better.



WATERTON HISTORY

Tawny Bertolozzi

- The area that we now call Waterton Lakes National Park has a long history with nomadic Indigenous peoples; they would camp, hunt and gather plants along the lakes and river in the Waterton area. However, it wasn't until the middle of the 1800's that the first visit was made to the areas by Lt. Thomas Blakiston.
- On a scouting expedition for the railway through the mountains, Lt. Thomas Blakiston named three large lakes he came across "Waterton", after British naturalist Charles Waterton.
- In 1902, the first oil strike occurred, producing a flow of 300 barrels/day of high grade oil at "Original Discovery No.1" well site in Cameron Valley.
 - In 1904, the Western Coal and Oil Company was responsible for the first settlement in the townsite. They constructed a cook-house, bunk-house, blacksmith shop, office, stable, and engine room.
- In 1932, Waterton Lakes National Park along with Glacier National Park in Montana became the world's first International Peace Park.
- More than half of Alberta's plant species can be found in Waterton. This is just one of the reasons why Waterton Lakes National Park was the first Canadian national park to be designated as a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve in 1979.
- Recognizing its significance in ecological diversity and its model of cooperation and good will, Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park was officially designated a UNESCO Natural World Heritage Site in 1995.
- The park has two National Historic Sites located within its boundaries: the First Oil Well in Western Canada NHS (designated in 1968) and the Prince of Wales Hotel NHS (designated in 1995).
 - Waterton Lakes National Park and Glacier National Park are the first two parks to be recognized as the first transboundary IDA International Dark Sky Park. Dark Sky Park status means that the parks and their communities are reducing the amount of light that is sent up into the sky at night. Anyone who loves to stargaze will enjoy coming to Waterton.







M.V. INTERNATIONAL

Built on Waterton Lake in 1927, the 165-passenger Historic M.V. International shuttles passengers across the liquid border shimmering between Goat Haunt, Montana and Emerald Bay in Waterton Park, Alberta. Once upon a time, during the days of Alberta's so-called Blue-Laws, the vessel was used as a boat of festivities, so that people could step aboard to enjoy music, dance and drink in Montana (outside of Alberta's jurisdiction.)


As part of the fleet manned by the family owned-and-operated Waterton Shoreline Cruise Company, the International is the oldest operating passenger vessel in Canada. The International is a wooden ship of cedar/fir planking on oak frames and is continuously being maintained using traditional shipbuilding techniques.



WATERTON'S WRECK: THE GERTRUDE

Below the depths of Emerald Bay lies the steam paddle wheeler, "Gertrude". Built in 1907 on Maskinonge Lake in Waterton, she was originally used as a work boat for a nearby sawmill, but eventually transitioned into a tea room and restaurant moored in Emerald Bay. In 1918 Gertrude was deliberately scuttled in the bay and is now a popular destination for scuba diving enthusiasts with a penchant for history.

A HISTORICAL WALKING TOUR OF WATERTON COMMERCIAL AND COMMUNITY BUILDINGS

Waterton's history includes some of the best kept secrets. Listed below are several the historic commercial and community buildings that have made what Waterton is today. This one-hour walking tour will take you through Waterton's townsite guiding you through the earliest community establishments, dating from the early 1900's to the end of the World War II era.

START AT 214 MOUNT VIEW ROAD

1 THE TAMARACK – WATERTON'S OUTDOOR STORE – 214 MOUNT VIEW ROAD

Constructed 1922 – 1932. Built to include an automobile showroom, a garage and an office, the exterior lines of this building are unchanged from 1932, despite many interior renovations. The original owner, George Baker, used the building for his many enterprises, and over 90 years later, his descendants still own and operate the business!


2 PARK ADMINISTRATION BUILDING – 215 MOUNT VIEW ROAD

Constructed 1919-1936- As the construction dates suggest, this building grew as Waterton grew, and the park administration responsibilities required more people and more space. The 1935 addition to include a visitor information office was carried out as part of a make-work Depression Relief project. A large stonearched doorway, built to impress the visitor, is still visible inside the building. In 2002, a rear addition was torn down and replaced by an interpretive garden.

• Cross the parking lot to the marina on the lakeshore

3 M.V INTERNATIONAL – ON THE MARINA

Built on Waterton Lake in 1927, the 165-passenger Historic M.V. International shuttles passengers across the liquid border shimmering between Goat Haunt, Montana and Emerald Bay in Waterton Park, Alberta. Once upon a time, during the days of Alberta's so-called Blue-Laws, the vessel was used as a boat of festivities, so that people could step aboard to enjoy music, dance and drink in Montana (outside of Alberta's jurisdiction). NOTE: The MV International may be out on a cruise during your tour.



6 EVERGREEN GIFTS/GUST GALLERY – 112 WATERTON AVENUE


allow cars to pull right in for servicing.

Constructed 1927- Built by Oland and Scott Construction for Mabel and Nahor Dilatush, the Stanley Hotel has changed little. Named for their oldest son, the Stanley was designed by W.D. Cromarty of the Park Branch Architectural Division and superintendent from 1925 to 1929, who was committed to creating character buildings for Waterton's heritage. This "Tudor-Rustic" style, with exposed half-timbers and gabled roofline, is common throughout the park thanks to him.

FIRESIDE LOUNGE/CHOPHOUSE RESTAURANT/GLACIER BISTRO – 109 WATERTON AVENUE

Constructed 1935- This lovely building features a façade of colourful and unusual stones, selected from the Waterton environment. For many years it was known as The Kootenai Brown Dining Room. It also features the half-timbering details common in Waterton architecture, and compliments the heritage feel of the commercial district.

• Return to the corner of Mount View Road and Waterton Avenue



• Walk Down Mount View Road and turn right on Waterton Avenue

Constructed 1928 - This is one of Waterton's oldest buildings

and was built to service the growing automobile transportation

needs of the community and visitors. Originally named "Waterton Motors", it was designed in the era when the parks branch architectural division kept a firm control over the design of

Waterton construction, insisting on "Tudor-Rustic" or Swiss chaletthemed structures. The center section was originally open, to

PAT'S WATERTON – 224 MOUNT VIEW ROAD

5 LARKSPUR COFFEEHOUSE – 110 WATERTON AVENUE Constructed 1922- You are looking at Waterton's oldest original

8 BAYSHORE CONVENTION CENTRE/ THIRSTY BEAR KITCHEN + BAR – 115 WATERTON AVENUE

Constructed 1938 – This was the site of the beautiful and famous Waterton Dance Pavilion. Built by Oland and Scott in 1926, it was such a lovely building that they were hired the next year to build the Prince of Wales Hotel. To the town's dismay, the dance pavilion burned down in January 1938, to be replaced by the building before you. It served as a dance pavilion until 1976, when it was sold and incorporated into the Bayshore Inn complex.

2 MY SISTER'S ROOM – 114 WATERTON AVENUE

Constructed 1928 – Mabel and Nahor Dilatush, responsible for the Stanley Hotel and the Tourist Café, had this charming building constructed as a butcher shop. They made sure the building complemented the heritage feel of their other buildings, by featuring half-timber detailing, a stone façade and the arched window above doorway. It has seen many uses over the years.

FORMER WATERTON HERITAGE CENTRE – 117 WATERTON AVENUE

Constructed 1952- This building was constructed by the park as the town's first fire hall. The first fire hall attendant, Ron Simmons, had a tiny little room off to the side of where the truck parked as a sleeping quarters! When the new fire hall was built in 1978, the charming old fire hall was slated for demolition. From 1986 to 2017, Parks Canada provided a licence of occupation for the building to the Waterton Natural History Association, a non-profit organization that operated a museum and bookstore and ran visitor programs such as geocaching and kiting.

11 RCMP HEADQUARTERS – 202 WATERTON AVENUE

Constructed 1927-28 – This lovely building benefits by being built during the building boom of the late 1920's, using the same crew that built the Prince of Wales and associated buildings. It is considered the best design by W.D. Cromarty of the Park Branch Architectural Division. The second building on the lot was originally the stable and jail cell, imported at the time from the Kingston Penitentiary! These buildings are now on the designated federal heritage register.

• Turn right on Cameron Falls Drive, then left on Windflower Avenue

2 WATERTON LAKES OPERA HOUSE – 309 WINDFLOWER AVENUE

Constructed 1935 – An excellent example of design by the Park Branch Architectural Division, George Brewerton built this cinema, a function it retains to this day. But the name has changed over the years from Brewerton's, to Mayfair Theatre, to The Centre, to Alpine Cinema and finally The Waterton Lakes Opera House! The original wooden seats were bolted onto planks, which were pushed to the side during the day to allow roller skating on the flat hardwood floor. The heritage seats now in the theatre were brought in from an old vaudeville theatre in Great Falls in the 1960's, complementing the heritage of the beloved cinema.

13 ROCKY MOUNTAIN FOOD MART – 307 WINDFLOWER AVENUE

Constructed 1935-36 – George Delaney, a much-beloved Waterton character, took the lease on this bare lot in 1934 to build a grocery store- as long as he could be a year-round resident. Parks allowed this, and their architectural division even designed the original building. The hip-roofed building was originally sided with log, and has the half-timbered detailing prevalent in building designs of that era. It has always operated as a grocery store, but now operates seasonally.

14 PEARL'S CAFÉ – 305 WINDFLOWER AVENUE

The older building on this site was constructed in 1936 by Oland and Scott Construction, who built the Prince of Wales. It was a grocery store for a number of years until 1944, when it became Waterton's first liquor store. After a new Alberta Liquor Control Board was built in 1961, it went back to being a grocery store, owned at this time by J.A. Greene. Greene sold it to Pearl Irvine in the 1970's, who started a pizza parlour, and her name is on the building to this day.

• Return to Cameron Falls Drive and turn right

15 COMMUNITY CENTRE (OLD SCHOOL)

Established 1925 – Establishing a school was a priority for park officials as early as 1919, but it wasn't until 1925 that a one-room schoolhouse was built. In 1928, the colonnaded portico of field stone was added, designed by W.D. Cromarty of the Park Branch Architectural Division. By 1931, there were two classrooms for the 30 students, and a gym was added in the 1940's. But by 1995, there were not enough year-round residents to keep a school going, and the building then took on the role as a community centre.

• Continue south on Evergreen Avenue past Cameron Falls

16 NORTHLAND LODGE – 408 EVERGREEN AVENUE

Constructed 1928- This classic Swiss chalet-style lodge was built at the same time as the Prince of Wales Hotel, as the personal lodge for the Great Northern Railway's boss, Louis W. Hill. He named it Carthew Lodge. But he preferred to stay at his beloved Prince of Wales, and is said to have never slept here. Fred Udell, who worked at the Prince of Wales for many years, became caretaker of the place, and raised his family here. In 1949, the lodge was sold and refitted for guest accommodation under the name of Northland Lodge.

• Return to Cameron Falls Drive and turn left on Fountain Avenue

OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL CATHOLIC CHURCH – 211 FOUNTAIN AVENUE

Constructed 1950-1951- This lovely rustic church was a labour of love for the nearby towns after the first Catholic church, built in 1929 of green logs, was condemned in 1947. After money was raised from donations, material and labour came from Pincher Creek, Cardston, Twin Butte and some of the Waterton cabin owners. The church changed the original name of "Precious Blood" to "Our Lady of Mount Carmel" to reflect its mountain setting, and the first mass was held July 1, 1951.

18 LIONS HALL – 209 FOUNTAIN AVENUE

Established 1949- The Lions Club of Waterton were a determined bunch to establish Waterton's first community hall. With monies scratched together by fundraisers, they purchased a surplus building from the Fort Macleod war-time flight training school to move to Waterton. This one fell apart on the trip down. After more fundraising, another building was purchased in 1949 and successfully moved. But it was bigger than the original building, and so the Lions Club simply asked Catholic Church officials if they could have eight feet of their adjacent lot! Park officials in Ottawa were not impressed when they found out afterwards.

• Walk to the end of the street and turn left on Mount View Road

19 CRANDELL MOUNTAIN LODGE – 102 MOUNT VIEW ROAD

Constructed 1939-1940 – The construction of Crandell Lodge created a bit of a stir back in 1939, as it was to use two commercial lots. But because of its prominent location, park officials allowed Hilding Hagglund to go ahead, with some revisions to the style. As a result, this handsome lodge, named for the mountain that looms above it, is another 'Tudor-Rustic'-style historical treasure.

• Turn right at the three way stop and walk up the hill. Turn up the side road on the right just after the turn-off into the picnic ground.

20 PRINCE OF WALES STAFF ACCOMMODATION

Constructed 1927-28 – When the Great North Railway set about to build 'helps buildings' for their Prince of Wales Hotel, the Parks office was very firm they adhere to the Swiss Chalet architectural theme. As a result, the three attractive buildings serve as a link of the chalet-style to the Tudor-Rustic architectural theme being developed in the town site at the time.


21 PRINCE OF WALES STAFF COTTAGE

Constructed 1927-28 – Built at the same time as the three dormitory staff buildings, this lovely cottage originally served as a recreation facility for the Prince of Wales staff. It was designed to complement the Swiss-theme, and now is used for staff accommodation.

22 PRINCE OF WALES HOTEL

Constructed 1926-27- Whole books have been written about the iconic Prince of Wales Hotel, full of great stories and anecdotes. The last of the lodges in Waterton-Glacier to be built by the Great Northern Railway, this grand Swiss chalet-themed hotel firmly placed Waterton on the tourism map. No expense was spared on the \$1 million hotel. Great Northern's boss himself Louis W. Hill changed the blueprints from a four-storey structure to the seven storey building with the great sweeping roofline that pays tribute to the mountain peaks all around. Rooms started at \$8.50 a night when it opened July 25, 1927, and included three meals a day. Spend some time at the towering windows in the lobby to soak in the view that inspired the construction of this marvelous architectural treasure. **END OF TOUR**

INDIGENOUS PRESENCE IN WATERTON



Waterton Lakes National Park is part of the traditional territory and a place of significance of the Blackfoot (Nitsitappii). Indigenous presence in southwest Alberta can be traced back almost 12,000 years, and at least 10,000 years in Waterton Lakes National Park. There are signs of campsites, fire rings, bison drive lanes, and other cultural features.

The land, water, air, animals and plants are all interconnected with significant meaning, and are woven together into the fabric of contemporary Blackfoot life.

One of the most sacred places to the Blackfoot in Waterton Lakes National Park is the Maskinonge Day Use Area and Overlook on the south side of the Waterton River, along Highway 5 just before the Chief Mountain turnoff. This wetland is a resting point for migratory animals in spring and fall.

The remains of a ceremonial sweat lodge and a medicine wheel can be found at the Maskinonge. The medicine wheel was created during the 2011 Blackfoot Conference held in Waterton Lakes National Park. The medicine wheel symbolizes stewardship and connection with the land, and should be respected and honoured.

Parks Canada and the Blackfoot have worked together to offer programs and events to share Blackfoot culture and knowledge with the many thousands who visit Waterton every year.

Waterton Lakes National Park is one of the best places to view wildlife in the Rocky Mountains.

Seeing wildlife can be a special moment in one's lifetime; the opportunity to be with wildlife is a privilege. Many wild animals consider Waterton their home, and their home should always be respected. We have a role to play in helping to keep wildlife natural and safe.

The opportunity to photograph wild animals within a safe distance is abundant. Often roadways will be congested with deer or big horn sheep. While hiking you may come across fresh laid tracks, diggings or scat indicating the presence of wildlife. If you are observant you will notice the clues that wildlife leaves behind. Bears are good climbers and will leave scars on tree bark. Animals will frequent the same trails; if you are moving through a path where you suddenly find you must crouch down low on a defined trail you may want to choose a different route as it probably is not a human trail. Parks Canada has a variety of programs that will help you develop your wildlife identification skills in both the summer and winter. Or take in the annual Waterton Wildlife Festival in September to learn more about Waterton's amazing wild creatures.

Moose, bear, elk, deer, lynx, and 57 other mammals (not to mention 250 species of birds, 6 species of amphibians, 4 species of reptiles, and 24 species of fish) are found in this 505 square kilometre (195 square mile) protected area.



WILDLIFE SAFETY & VIEWING TIPS

Wildlife viewing opportunities abound in Waterton Lakes National Park and the perfect picture never seems to be very far away. But wait! For your health and safety, as well as that of the many different species of animal in Waterton, please do not approach, touch or feed any wildlife. Please keep the following in mind.

- It is illegal to feed, entice, or disturb any wildlife in a national park! Don't believe us? Just check the Canada National Parks Act.
- Feeding wildlife causes them to become habituated and dependent on human handouts (this includes trying to feed grasses and leaves to a deer). Wildlife may forget how to acquire their natural food sources and the end result could be that the animals do not survive the harsh winters. Especially keep this in mind when you see the "friendly chippies" (chipmunks and golden-mantled ground squirrels) that often hang out atop the Bear's Hump and near Cameron Falls.
- While the deer, sheep and other animals that hang around the townsite may seem cute, and tame enough to pet, this activity should be avoided. If bothered enough, these ungulates have been known to rear up, swing their sharp front hooves and knock people to the ground. People of all ages have had aggressive enounters with deer and sheep.
- Some wildlife may carry diseases that can be transmitted to people simply by touching and petting them. Of course, further complications can arise if you are bitten by an animal.
- Make sure to keep your domestic pets on a lead, as it is illegal to have pets off leash in a national park. Some animals in Waterton Park, like the deer, have a history of demonstrating aggressive behavior towards dogs, so always keep your distance and be aware.
- Remain in your vehicle if you spot wildlife while driving around Waterton, especially if you see a bear! Also make sure to slow the vehicle down and pull over to the shoulder of the road for safety reasons. Follow all posted speed limits and be careful on the roads.
- It is recommended that you stay at least 30m (100') away from large mammals (and even further away from bears).
- Wildlife are unpredictable and you should never turn your back on an animal, especially not to take a selfie.

- Wildlife tend to be less active during the heat of the day, so plan to go exploring in the early morning hours, or in the lateafternoon / evening.
- When hiking in bear country, make sure to announce your presence in advance by talking loudly within your group (four or more people is best), singing songs, shouting out, or clapping your hands, etc. Bear Bells are not necessarily loud enough to carry through the forest. The last thing you want to do is surprise a mother bear with cubs.
- If you do encounter a bear, stay calm and talk to the bear as you back away slowly (do not turn your back). Make yourself appear big by picking up small children and remaining in a group. Do not drop your backpack or bag. Keep bear spray accessible and make sure you are prepared and know how to use it.
- In the extremely unlikely event that you encounter a cougar, or wolf, immediately pick up small children and pets. Make yourself appear as large as possible. Do not turn your back on the animal. Maintain eye contact and back away slowly; do not run and do not play dead.

DARK SKIES The stars and the moon shine bright in Waterton. On a clear night the dark skies might allow you to capture the Milky Way and the Northern Lights.



