

## WATERTON HISTORICAL BUILDINGS

“Larkspur Coffee House”  
110 Waterton Avenue

#5 on the History Walking Tour



If you are following the walking tour, you are now looking at Waterton’s oldest original restaurant. Built by Oland and Scott Construction, who also built the Prince of Wales and many other places, it was sold in 1924 to Mabel and Nahor Dilatush. They would also build the Stanley Hotel and the building now known as My Sister’s Closet. With the Waterton Dance Pavilion right across the street for decades, the very popular Tourist Café kept late hours to keep the party going!

**BUILT:** 1922

**BUILDERS:** Oland & Scott Construction

**OF NOTE:** The Tourist Café would stay open in July and August to 3 am in the 1930’s, and round the clock in the 1950’s.
