



Trail Use Guidelines

- Trails are open from dawn to dusk, 365 days a year.
- Please stay on the established trails.
- Foot traffic only. Please, no bicycles or horses.
- Dogs must be on a leash and under control at all times.
- Please don't litter and pick up after your dog. Receptacles are available at the trail heads and along trails.
- Be respectful of the Black Family Tomb. No climbing.
- The trails are easy with flat terrain, but watch your footing on the natural forest floor.

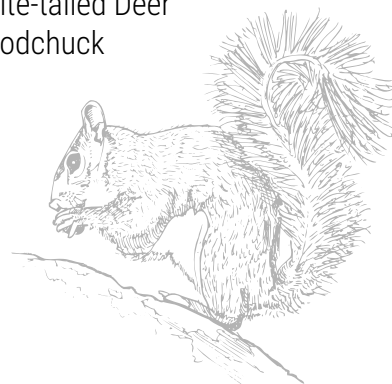

Trail Names and Horses of Woodlawn

Woodlawn has over 180 acres, most of which is forested. Third generation owner of the property, Nixon Black, had the trails created, we believe in the 1890s for exercising his horses and to take family and friends on carriage rides.

The furthest trail, **Pompey**, is named after a horse owned by John and Mary (Cobb) Black in 1826. Pompey was used by John during many of his travels as the land agent for the Bingham Lands and is the only horse mentioned by name in his travel journals.

The middle trail, **Diamond**, is named after a horse owned by George and Mary (Peters) Black, a favorite of Mary (Peters) for her carriage rides about town.

The first trail, **Gander**, is named after a horse born at Woodlawn on May 25, 1904. Gander belonged to Nixon Black. This trail was also used by Nixon to race cars in his later years.
